"MY HEART REJOICES IN THE LORD"

1 Samuel 2:1

Hannah

Background

During the days of Hannah a woman's status was defined by her ability to bear children. Hannah could not have children, although she desperately wanted a son.

Problem

Hannah wanted to have a child but her womb was closed. To add to her troubles, her husband had another wife, Peninnah, who was able to have many children. Not only was Peninnah able to have children, she made it her mission to make Hannah miserable. She teased and tormented her and mocked her inability to have children. She wanted Hannah to become angry and bitter.

Solution

Prayer. Hannah poured her HEART out to God. The Bible tells us in 1 Samuel 1:10 that "in her deep distress, she prayed to the Lord and wept bitterly". During her prayer, she made a vow to the Lord. She promised if given a son, she would dedicate his life to the Lord.

Outcome

Hannah prayed a heartfelt prayer that God HEARD and ANSWERED. God didn't give Hannah just one child, but FIVE children. As promised, Hannah dedicated her first son, Samuel, to the Lord, and he grew up to be a great judge and prophet.

Why is Hannah's testimony important?

Living in a home with a bully who seemed to have everything Hannah wanted could have easily landed Hannah in the comparison trap. She could have easily ended up old, bitter and alone, but instead she brought her burden to God and He blessed her.

Deborah

Background

Deborah was a woman of high status. She was known as a prophetess (chosen by God to deliver His instructions). As a judge, she was responsible for settling disputes among the people. During this particular time period, it was not common for women to hold such titles. Because of this, we can conclude that Deborah must have been well-liked and respected by many. She was a powerful woman, securely connected to the one and only true source of power... God.

Problem

Israel was going into battle with Sisera. Judges 4 introduces us to an army commander, Barak. Deborah had specific instruction from God for Barak. He was to go into battle, and Sisera would be delivered into his hands. Barak refused to go unless Deborah went with him. It is important to know that the problem was not with Deborah, but with Barak. God had laid out a victory for him but he needed to take action.

Solution

Understanding the word of the Lord, Deborah led by taking action. She accompanied Barak into battle, and at the word of God, she told him when to "go".

Outcome

Through the obedience of Deborah and compliance of Barak, Sisera was defeated and delivered into the hands of Barak. Having achieved the victory, Deborah and Barak sang a song of worship.

Why is Deborah's testimony important?

Esther

Background

Esther was a Jewish orphan being raised by her uncle. During her life, the King of Persia was in need of a Queen, and because of the favor of God and man, Esther was made queen of Persia.

Problem

Esther was a Jewish woman but the king didn't know. Through a series of jealous acts, the king's best friend convinced the king to sign a law that would put all Jewish people to death. Esther was afraid to do anything about it because she didn't want to be put to death. She had a choice to either stay quiet and let her people die or to use her voice and save them.

Solution

Esther and the Jewish people fasted. They did not eat or drink for three days. She settled the dilemma in her heart and declared out loud, "if I should die, I die."

Outcome

Because of fasting and seeking the Lord, Esther was able to be led by God in how she should confront the problem. With boldness and much wisdom, she revealed her lineage to the king. He immediately took care of the problem and the king allowed Esther, on his behalf, to write a new law. Because Queen Esther was brave and stood against evil, millions of lives were saved.

Problem



Solution

Refusing to be bitter, Anna spends her days as a widow at the temple. In Luke 2, we are told, "she never left the temple but worshiped night and day, fasting and praying."

Outcome

Through her commitment and devotion, Anna saw the promise of the coming Messiah fulfilled. The moment she laid eyes on baby Jesus in the temple, she immediately thanked God and told everyone who would listen that redemption had come.

Ruth

Background

Ruth was a woman who married into a family that suffered a great deal of loss—the type of loss that touched everyone in the family. For Ruth, it was the loss of her husband. Because of his death, she was faced with multiple decisions that would determine the rest of her life.

Problem

After the loss of her husband, Ruth lived in a town with her sister- and mother-in-law. Her mother-in- law, Naomi, came to a realization: she had nothing left to offer her daughter-in-laws. Hopeless, she tried to make them leave; but Ruth loved Naomi deeply and couldn't imagine ever leaving her. Faced with a dilemma, Ruth could either return to her own family and perhaps remarry one of her own kinsmen or stay with Naomi and face unknown hardship.

Solution

Ruth settled in her heart to remain with Naomi and made an oath to make Naomi's God, her God. While with Naomi, Ruth didn't sit around waiting for things to get worse, she went to work in the fields, gleaning whatever grain she could for food.

Outcome

By no coincidence, Ruth gleamed from the field of Boaz. Boaz was a very wealthy man, who by Jewish law could redeem Ruth. Through Ruth's hard work and obedience to Naomi, found favor in the eyes of Boaz. Boaz blessed and redeemed her. They married and became a key couple in the genealogy of Jesus.

Background

Problem



Furthermore, Jesus, a Jew, asked her, a Samaritan woman, for a drink from the well.

Solution

Taken aback by Jesus, the woman at the well stood and talked with Him. He asked her questions about her life, and she engaged by asking Him questions as well.

Outcome

Jesus revealed himself to her as the Messiah. He told her things about herself no one but God could know. He also told her He was "living water". Those who will take a drink of Him will never thirst again. She believed him! She she went away excited, telling everyone the Messiah had come.
